# Notes of visit by Kim Bishop Senior Education Improvement Officer 25<sup>th</sup> September

Positive Points:

- The Head Teacher and SENCo have a clear idea of what good or better provision for children with SEN looks like
- The school tracking system supports identification of children not making expected progress
- > The school has clear systems in place

Areas for development:

- Robustly monitor the impact of additional provision for pupils with SEN
- > Continue to monitor the deployment of support staff to ensure value for money
- > Fully align whole school systems with SEN systems

### Notes of visit by Maths Consultant – September 2012

Strengths:

- Subject leaders were open and honest about their need to develop their roles and were keen to work together. Their attitude was professional and reflective and I think they have the capacity to develop this subject well.
- Most staff engaged well with the practical elements of the mathematics training. They must now consider how to continue this engagement with their pupils in their classrooms

Areas for development:

It is crucial that the staff work together as a whole school, developing their skills and sharing expertise

The table below shows the school's improvement in 2012, especially in English, which was a special focus for us. (The national scores for 2012 have not yet been published)
